
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SCENARIO 2 - LUKE'S JOURNEY

Key Terms

Gap Year or Gap Semester : The Gap Year Association defines this time as "a semester or year of experiential learning , typically taken after high school and prior to career or postsecondary education, in order to deepen one's practical, professional and personal awareness." Some students choose to take a gap year in the middle of pursuing a degree.

Workforce : The term "workforce" refers to the workers engaged in a specific activity or enterprise (e.g., "the factory's workforce") or the number of workers potentially assignable for any purpose (e.g., "the nation's workforce").

<u>Community Colleges</u>: These colleges offer 2-year programs leading to an Associate of Arts (AA) or Associate of Science (AS) degree. They also have technical and vocational programs with close links to secondary/high schools, community groups, and employers in the local community. You can usually find large community colleges with multiple campuses in an urban/suburban setting or small campuses in a rural setting.

<u>Vocational Schools</u>: Also known as trade schools, vocational schools prepare students to enter career fields that require specialized training. People who attend trade school can have careers as electricians, dental hygienists, veterinary technicians, plumbers, and more.

Certification : A certification is a credential you earn to show you have specific skills or knowledge. Certifications are usually tied to an occupation, technology, or industry and are usually offered by a professional organization or a company that specializes in a particular field or technology.


