

Agencies funded by the Ohio Commission on Fatherhood offer services to the public in 20 + counties in Ohio for FREE. ODYS has collaborated with previously funded OCF agencies to provide programming to teen fathers for FREE.

Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

- The Dolly Parton Imagination Library was launched in 1995 in her home county in East Tennessee. The program sends more than one million age-appropriate books monthly to children ages 0-5 around the world.
- Since launching, it has been replicated nationally in most US states and has expanded internationally in Canada, the United Kingdom, and Australia.
- *This program is FREE



Meaningful connections

A one-year collaboration between three agencies to deliver The New Playbook to ODYS youth. The curriculum promotes engaging men and boys to stop violence. These services were provided for FREE.











Meaningful Connections continued

An ongoing partnership with Nationwide Children's Hospital. For several years, ODYS has collaborated with Nationwide Children's Hospital on many different projects including First Fridays for Fathers, sponsoring our teen parent incentive store/ordering and funding supplies such as diapers, clothing, toys, cribs, providing food and prizes for teen parents during programming, providing printing materials such as thank you cards for parenting partners, and mentoring and presenting to youth in ODYS facilities. These services were provided for FREE.







First Fridays for Fathers

Collaboration with Nationwide Children's Hospital

NCH provided a supportive role to ODYS and its program partners. They helped to deliver a series of medically related educational topics one time per month for a two-year period for teen fathers placed in ODYS facilities. The information was introduced in game formats and addressed subjects such as infant mortality reduction, infant/toddler health, health literacy, paternal responsibility in child health outcomes, men's health, importance of breastfeeding, navigating my chart and electronic health records, child abuse prevention, safe spacing, (reducing risks of pregnancy complications), addressing racial disparities in health care, navigating the terrible two's, differentiating between types of cries, how to calm baby down, how to play with child, importance of scheduling, consistency, and bedtime routines. This collaboration was FREE.

First Fridays for Fathers (continued)

During Child Abuse Prevention Month, guest speakers from The Ohio Children's Trust Fund provided an overview of FREE resources and services from their Early Childhood Safety Initiative to include:

- Child safety education
- Up to \$500 in child safety items such as: Strollers, carriers, and car seats
- Cribs and toddler beds
- Child proofing (locks, knob covers, baby gates, etc.)
- Sleep sacks
- Baby monitors

 Triple P Online is a self-paced online parent training programs. Triple P is "based on a public health model of parent education and support to promote children's healthy development, encourage desirable behavior, teach new skills and behaviors, manage problem behaviors, plan ahead for high-risk times, and raise confident, capable children".





- Sometimes you need a different/fresh perspective.
- Sometimes referrals are needed.

HOW - To avoid problems and overcome obstacles and barriers

- Follow policies
- Seek advice and approval from legal departments
- Seek approval from agency administration
- Vet potential volunteers
- Volunteer applications
- Background checks/fingerprinting
- Approve/denial process

- Seek 2nd opinion
- Check with your Superiors
- Maintain confidentiality
- Inventory
- Keep tracking process
- Keep packing slips
- Keep receipts
